

## Haryana CM announces Five fold increase in outlay for Technical Education

*Invites Apeejay to set up technical institutions in Haryana*

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Speaking at the 11th Convocation of Apeejay Education Society at Dwarka, New Delhi, Haryana Chief Minister Shri B.S. Hooda informed that the budget for the current year for technical education had been increased to Rs.150 crore from Rs.30 crore in 2004-05. These he informed were under active consideration of the government. The number of seats in technical institutions will also be increased from the present 78,000 to one lakh by 2010, he added.
